Introduction to Fine Arts

This course is designed to give high school students an experience in several fine arts areas. By exploring at least three of the four areas of Fine Arts, students will develop problem-solving and critical-thinking skills, enhance their creativity and perceptual skills, and develop an appreciation for the arts which in turn will reinforce their academic skills. The relationships among these arts areas will also be explored through common.

Theatre Arts I

Theater Arts I is primarily an action class in which the student will be involved in theater activities. The student will learn about theater and then produce plays. Units of study are as follows: pantomime, improvisational acting, writing scripts, lighting, costumes, makeup, set design, advertising plays, acting, and directing. Theater Arts I classes will produce a one-act play during the second semester. All theater arts classes will attend professional productions throughout the school year.

Theatre Arts II/III

Theatre II/III is an advanced class focusing on performance elements and staging. Students must have a firm grasp of stage skills and theatre knowledge in order to advance. Theatre II/III students are dedicated to creating performances for a variety of genres; at the end of the year, all advanced students will perform one final show for an audience that focuses on the best pieces from the year.

Theatre Arts IV

Theatre IV is an advanced class focusing on performance elements, staging, directing, and playwriting. Students will use the skills gained in previous classes in order to step into the role of director and producer. An emphasis is placed on script study and performance skills. At the end of the year, all advanced students will perform one final show for an audience that focuses on the best pieces from the year.

Duel Enrollment Theatre Arts – University of Tennessee at Martin

Duel Enrollment Theatre Arts is an advanced class offered in association with UT Martin. This class incorporates all elements of the art of theatre. We talk about the aesthetics, origins and development of theatre, as well as the social implications and practical processes involved in producing live theatre. Lecture, discussion, videos, and live theatre performances are used to bring students to an appreciation of the vital role theatre plays in society. An emphasis is placed on script study and performance skills.

Through a variety of theatre games and exercises, students will explore the foundations of improvised comedy and develop the skills to grow into generous, supportive scene partners.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Junior Artists Company,

For ages 10-14. This 12-week session is designed to step up the theatre skills of young artists. Skills are taken to the next level by incorporating text analysis into the process. Additionally, junior artists also explore how to create believable characters and realistic relationships onstage.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Journey to the Center of the Earth,

For ages 8-10. This 4-week session is designed to explore different theatrical genres through theatre games, dramatic exercises, and character building. Students work together as a team to learn new ways to use their voices and bodies expressively, create bold characters, and discover the fundamentals of storytelling.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Adventures on the High Seas,

For ages 8-10. This 4-week session is designed to explore different theatrical genres through theatre games, dramatic exercises, and character building. Students work together as a team to learn new ways to use their voices and bodies expressively, create bold characters, and discover the fundamentals of storytelling.

*Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Theatre Voyagers for ASD,

This class is for youth with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) ages 8 and up. This class is an adaptation of NCT's Theatre Voyagers class into a six-week session where 2 teaching artists, six children on the spectrum and two peer models (typically developing young people of the same age) will work to adapt an original, informal "show" to be presented to friends and family on the final day of class.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Digital Storytelling—Going Places,

For ages 8-10. Digital Storytelling combines theatre, visual art, and creative writing to create a dynamic piece of digital art. Each class will create their own original short film featuring collage, photography, and a unique voice-over based on a theme. NCT will screen these digital stories on October 26th, and all students will receive a DVD copy of the stories created.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Playvention,

For ages 8-10. Playvention is a made-up word combining play and invention. Playvention is also a class in which your child will have the best time ever inventing a play. Students in Playvention test their creativity as they develop a basic story outline as a team, work together to create their own lines and staging, and then bring it all to life.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Treasure Trunk Theatre,

For ages 6-7. Everyday your child comes into Treasure Trunk Theatre, a new surprise awaits them! A magical treasure trunk, with ever-changing items discovered inside, becomes the basis for a collaborative drama experience. Each day, campers will find something new within the trunk that will inform the story they collectively create and ultimately share with you on stage. Using movement, vocal work, improvisation and creative drama techniques, kids will also stretch their imaginations, words, actions and ideas to develop a story like you've never heard before!

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Ensemble Acting,

For ages 11-13. For a variety of experience levels, this class develops skill and confidence as students analyze, rehearse, and perform scenes from classic and contemporary plays. This class investigates character development and acting technique through exploration of the director/actor relationship. Intensive scene work emphasizes the process of working with other actors to develop relationships on stage and find deeper meaning in the written word.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Solo Acting,

For ages 11-13. In this class, students will explore methods for developing characters through solo content for the stage. This might include unconventional monologues, self-written pieces, or character speeches taken from existing plays. Approaches to the work will emphasize making clear character choices and committing to these choices vocally and physically. Students will also learn to give supportive feedback to fellow actors, and to develop their own craft by observing the progress of their classmates.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Staging Stories,

For ages 8-10. Rooted in folklore, fables, myths and legends, your child will grow their understanding of storytelling and acting fundamentals while elevating one of these classic tales to new heights on the stage! Working closely with their classmates, students will develop characters, explore plot, and create staging based on the words from the original story. Enhancing understanding and increasing knowledge of the theatrical process, Staging Stories provides students with the tools to build the essentials of acting, commitment, and teamwork.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Musical Theatre Express,

For ages 10-13. This is an intermediate class. Students learn basic choreography and vocal techniques as they prepare a medley of popular musical numbers. Working as an ensemble, this class builds the essential musical theatre skills for emerging artists.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Advanced Voyagers,

For grades 6 - 8. The apex of the Theatre Voyagers expedition, campers focus more deeply on acting and character development through exercises, techniques, and improvisation. Campers engage in intensive, script-based scene work to find deeper meaning in the written word. This course prepares students for the next steps in our Emerging Artist Series.

Nashville Children's Theatre Academy Little Voyagers,

For grade K. This class offers your lil' camper the freedom to discover and delve into their own creativity! By creating characters and investigating places based in children's literature, campers will explore the building blocks of storytelling and develop physically, socially, and artistically through theatre games, creative movement, and improvisation.
